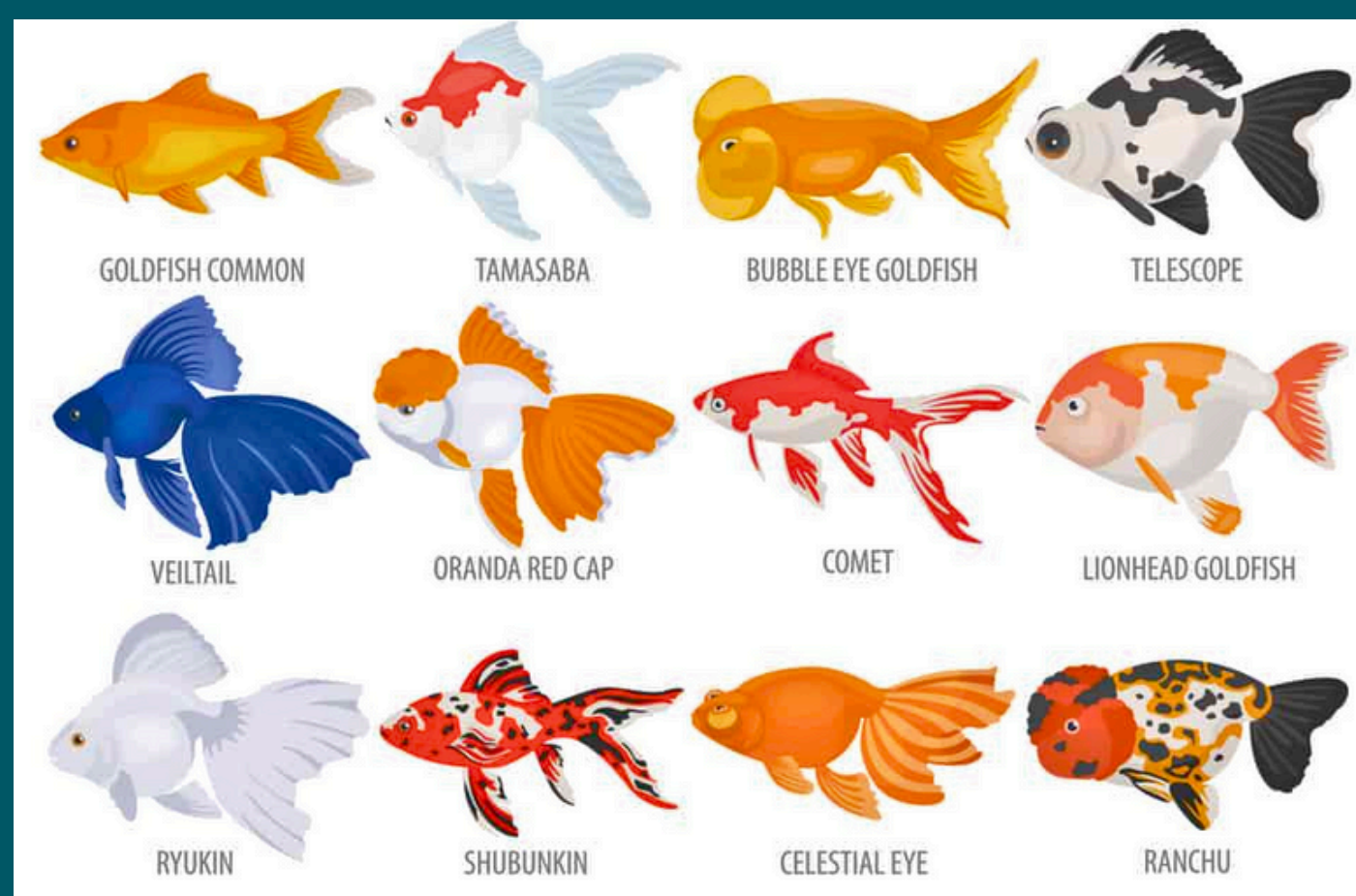
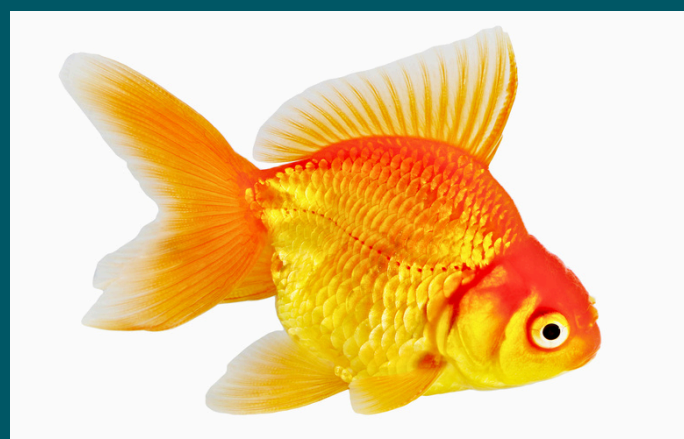

## Aqua Care

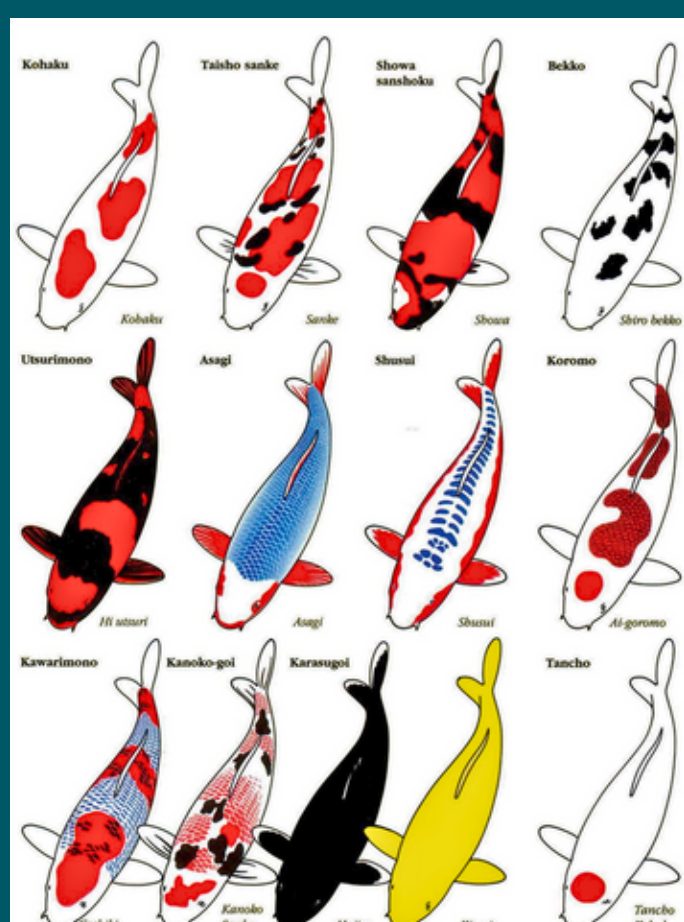
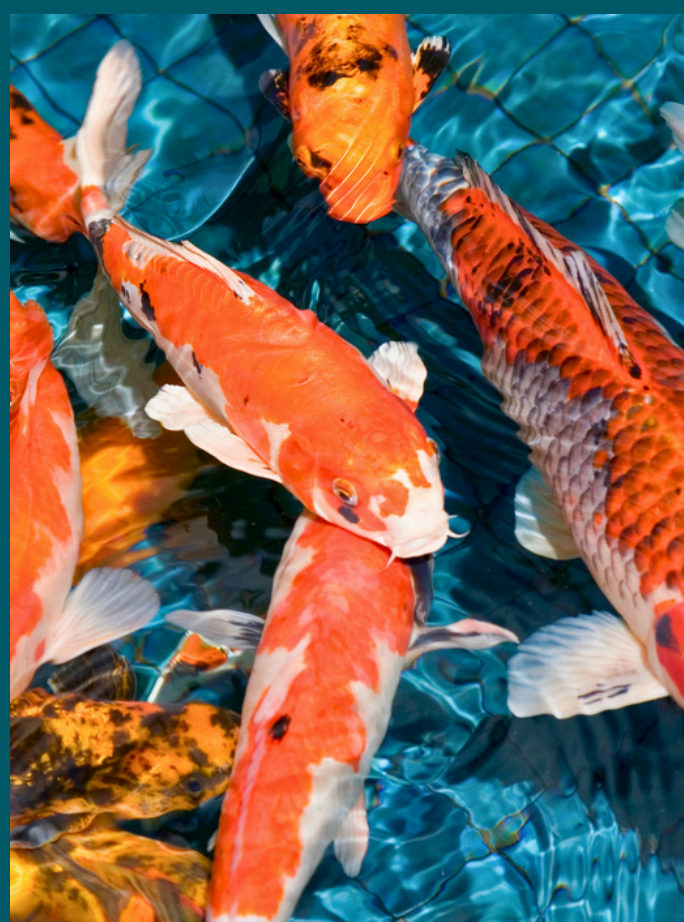
- ✓ Aquarium Suitability: Ideal for aquariums and ponds
- ✓ Beginner-Friendly: Yes
- ✓ Compatibility: Best with other goldfish varieties. Avoid keeping with small fish or fin-nipping species
- ✓ Diet: Omnivore – Eats pellets, flakes, vegetables, and live/frozen food
- ✓ Maintenance Level: Moderate – Requires frequent water changes and a strong filter due to high waste output
- ✓ Category:
  - Base hobbyist – Common goldfish, comet, shubunkin.
  - Dedicated hobbyist – Fancy varieties like fantail, ryukin, oranda.
  - Expert – Delicate fancy breeds like ranchu, telescope, or bubble eye, requiring extra care

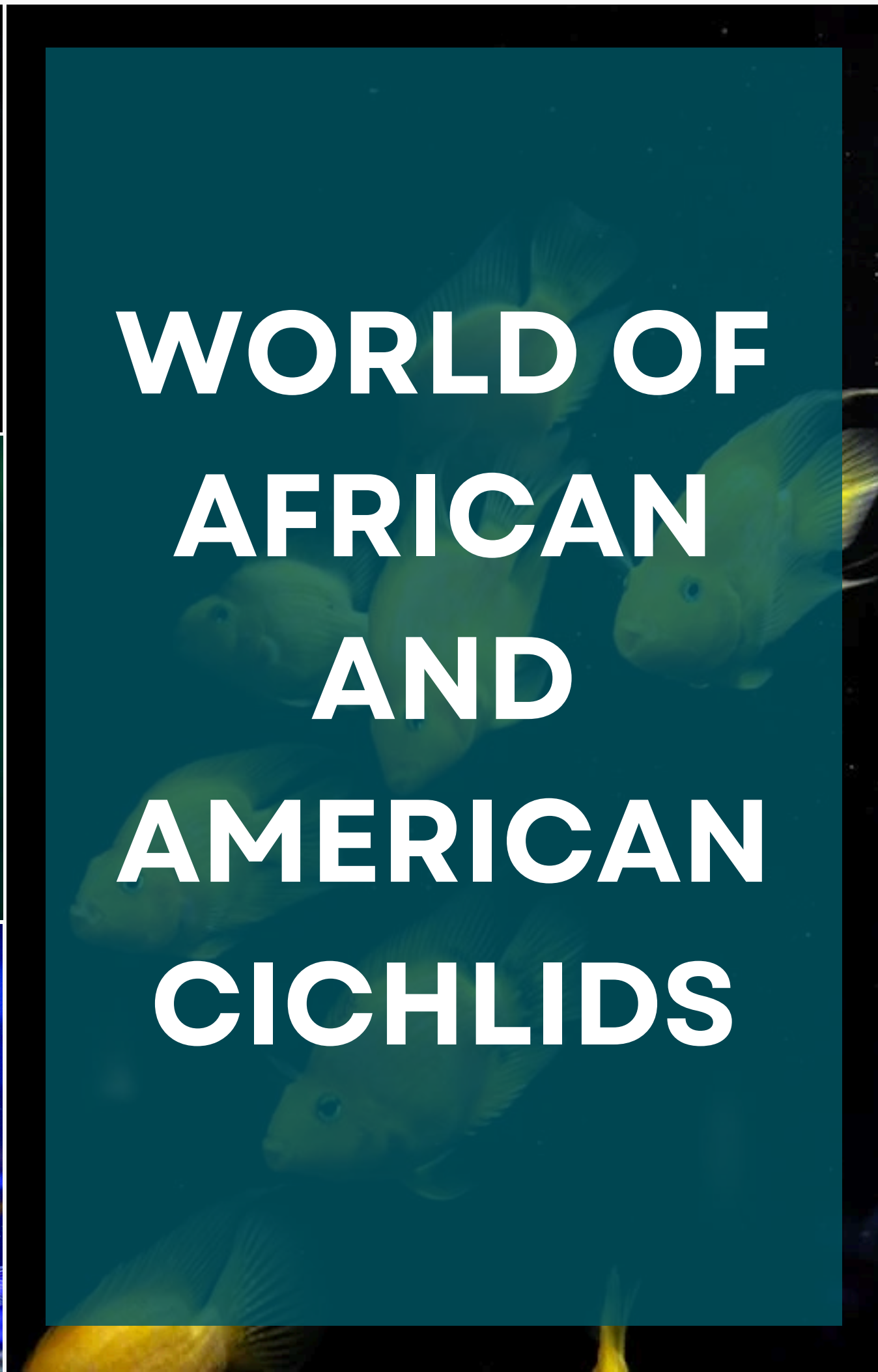

## Aqua Care

- ✓ Aquarium Suitability: Best for outdoor ponds
- ✓ Beginner-Friendly: No
- ✓ Compatibility: Best with other koi, peaceful pond fish, Avoid keeping with small fish or aggressive species
- ✓ Diet: Omnivore – Eats pellets, vegetables, and occasional live/frozen food
- ✓ Maintenance Level: Needs excellent filtration, regular water changes, and a well-maintained pond environment
- ✓ Varieties & Origin: Over 100+ varieties of koi exist. Japanese Koi are the original and other breeds like Vietnamese, Indian, and Thai Koi are more affordable replicas but do not grow as large (3feet) or live as long (60+ years). Other regional koi usually grow up to 1.5–2 feet (1–1.5 feet) and have shorter lifespans
- ✓ Category:
  - Dedicated Hobbyist – Standard koi varieties with basic pond setup.
  - Expert – High-grade Japanese koi





### Aqua Care - American Cichlids

- ✓ Beginner-Friendly: No (Most are territorial & aggressive)
- ✓ Compatible: Large cichlids, catfish, arowanas (depends on species)
- ✓ Diet: Omnivore (Pellets, live/frozen food, veggies)
- ✓ Maintenance Level: Moderate
- ✓ Category: ● Dedicated Hobbyist / ● Expert
- ✎ Note: Includes species like Oscars, Jack Dempseys, Green Terrors, and Firemouths. They require large tanks and careful tankmate selection

### Aqua Care - African Cichlids

- ✓ Beginner-Friendly? No (Highly territorial & need specific water conditions)
- ✓ Compatible With: Other African cichlids of similar aggression level
- ✓ Diet: Omnivore / Some Herbivore (Mbunas)
- ✓ Maintenance Level: Challenging
- ✓ Category: ● Expert
- ✎ Note: African cichlids (Mbuna, Peacock, Haplochromis) require hard, alkaline water (pH 7.5–9.0) and a rocky aquascape. Best in species-only tanks, not mixed with other fish

## AQUARIUM - DISCUS



### Aqua Care

- ✓ Beginner-Friendly: No (Needs stable water conditions & expert care)
- ✓ Compatible With: Tetras, Corydoras, Plecos, Rams, Peaceful Fish
- ✓ Diet: Omnivore (High-protein diet – Pellets, Bloodworms, Beef Heart, Brine Shrimp)
- ✓ Maintenance Level: Expert Level
- ✓ Category: ● Expert
- 📝 Note:
  - Needs warm water (82-86°F), soft & acidic (pH 6.0–7.0).
  - Best kept in groups (5-6 minimum) to reduce stress.
  - Cannot handle aggressive fish or unstable water parameters.
  - Requires frequent water changes (30-50% weekly) to stay healthy.

## Aqua Care - Sharks in Aquariums (Iridescent, Bala, Red Tail, Rainbow, etc.)

- ✓ Beginner-Friendly: No (Require large tanks, some are territorial), Small can be Kept
- ✓ Compatible: Fast-moving mid-to-large fish (Barbs, Loaches, Large Tetras, Gouramis)
- ✓ Diet: Omnivore
- ✓ Maintenance Level: Moderate
- ✓ Category: ●Dedicated Hobbyist / ●Expert

- 📝 Note: Aquarium "sharks" are not true sharks but are named for their torpedo-shaped bodies.
- Iridescent & Bala Sharks need huge tanks (125+ Liter) and prefer groups.
  - Red Tail & Rainbow Sharks are territorial, best kept alone or with strong mid-top dwellers.
  - Not suitable with Goldfish or slow, delicate fish due to fin-nipping tendencies.

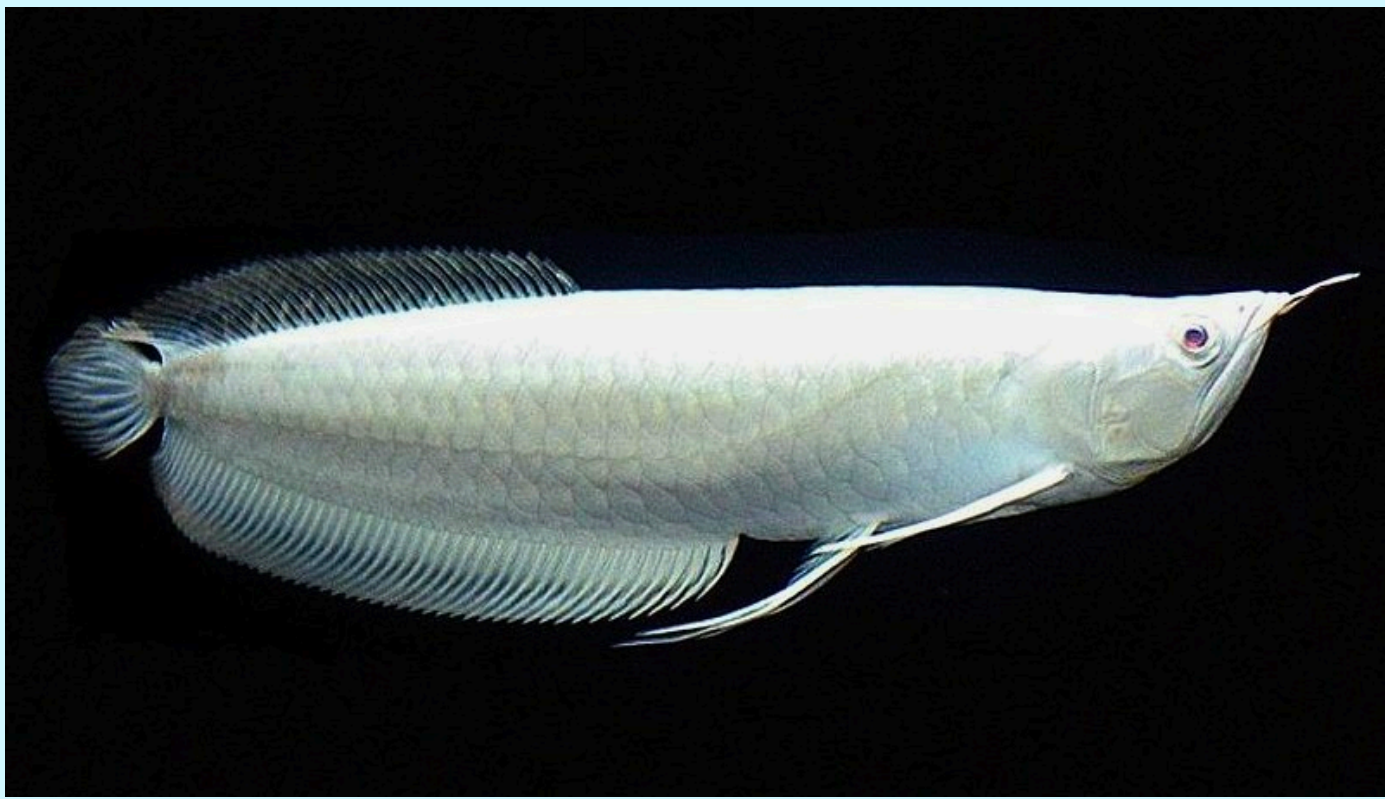

## Aqua Care

- ✓ **Aquarium Suitability:** Requires a very large tank (minimum 250+ Liter for adults)
- ✓ **Beginner-Friendly:** No
- ✓ **Compatibility:** Best with large, semi-aggressive fish like stingrays, bichirs, peacock bass, or large catfish. Avoid keeping with small fish (they will be eaten) or aggressive tank mates that might attack them
- ✓ **Diet:** Carnivore – Prefers a protein-rich diet, including live/frozen food (shrimp, fish, insects) and high-quality pellets
- ✓ **Maintenance Level:** High – Requires frequent water changes, powerful filtration, and a secure lid to prevent jumping
- ✓ **Varieties & Origin:** Found in Asia, South America, Africa, and Australia
  - **Popular Types:**
    - Asian Arowana – Most sought-after, comes in red, gold, and blue varieties. Highly regulated and expensive
    - Silver Arowana – Native to South America, grows up to 3 feet, more affordable
- ✓ **Category:**
  - ● Dedicated Hobbyist – Silver Arowana, with a large tank
  - ● Expert – Asian Arowana (requires legal permits), specialized diet, and high-maintenance setup

## Aqua Care

- ✓ **Aquarium Suitability:** Requires a large tank (minimum 75+ Liter per fish) due to its aggressive nature
- ✓ **Beginner-Friendly:** Not for beginners
- ✓ **Compatibility:** Best kept alone due to extreme aggression. If keeping with other fish, only with large, tough species like plecos or other aggressive cichlids (with dividers)
- ✓ **Diet:** Omnivore – Needs a high-protein diet with pellets, shrimp, bloodworms, and vegetables for color enhancement
- ✓ **Maintenance Level:** Moderate to High – Requires strong filtration, frequent water changes, and careful handling due to aggression
- ✓ **Varieties & Origin:** Hybrid Cichlid, created through selective breeding (not found in the wild)
- ✓ **Category:**
  -  **Dedicated Hobbyist**– Standard Flowerhorn with basic care.
  -  **Expert** – High-grade breeding, specialized diet, and aggressive tank management.

# KEY FACTORS FOR A SUCCESSFUL MONSTER FISH COMMUNITY



## Aqua Care

- **Tank Size** – Minimum 4 feet, but 5 feet tank is ideal.
- **Filtration** – Heavy-duty canister or sump filters to handle high bioload.
- **Tank Setup** – Large open swimming space with strong lids (many are jumpers).
- **Diet** – Most are carnivores, requiring protein-rich food.
- **Aggression Management** – Some species are territorial and must be monitored.
- **Compatibility** – Choose fish that grow to similar sizes to prevent predation

## Top Compatible Monster Fish (If tank size & setup allows)

Fish	Size	Temperament	Compatibility Notes
Arowana (Silver/Asian)	2.5-3 ft	Semi-aggressive	Best with other large, top/mid-water fish. Needs a secure lid.
Peacock Bass	2-3 ft	Aggressive	Fast predator, pairs well with Arowana and catfish.
Giant Gourami	2-2.5 ft	Semi-aggressive	Can live with other large fish, but varies in temperament.
Redtail Catfish	3-4 ft	Extremely aggressive	Best alone or with similar-sized tankmates like tiger shovelnose catfish.
Tiger Shovelnose Catfish	2.5-3 ft	Aggressive	Can be housed with other large catfish and arowanas.
Freshwater Stingray	1.5-2 ft (disk size)	Peaceful but predatory	Best with top swimmers like arowanas; avoid bottom dwellers.
Oscars	1-1.5 ft	Semi-aggressive	Can be with other large cichlids, catfish, or arowanas.
Flowerhorn	1-1.5 ft	Very aggressive	Best kept alone or with tough tankmates (separated if needed).

## Fish to Avoid in Monster Community Tanks

- ❌ Small fish (Easily eaten: Tetras, Barbs, Guppies)
- ❌ Highly aggressive fish (Some Cichlids, Puffers)
- ❌ Soft-bodied fish (Easily injured: Discus, Angelfish)

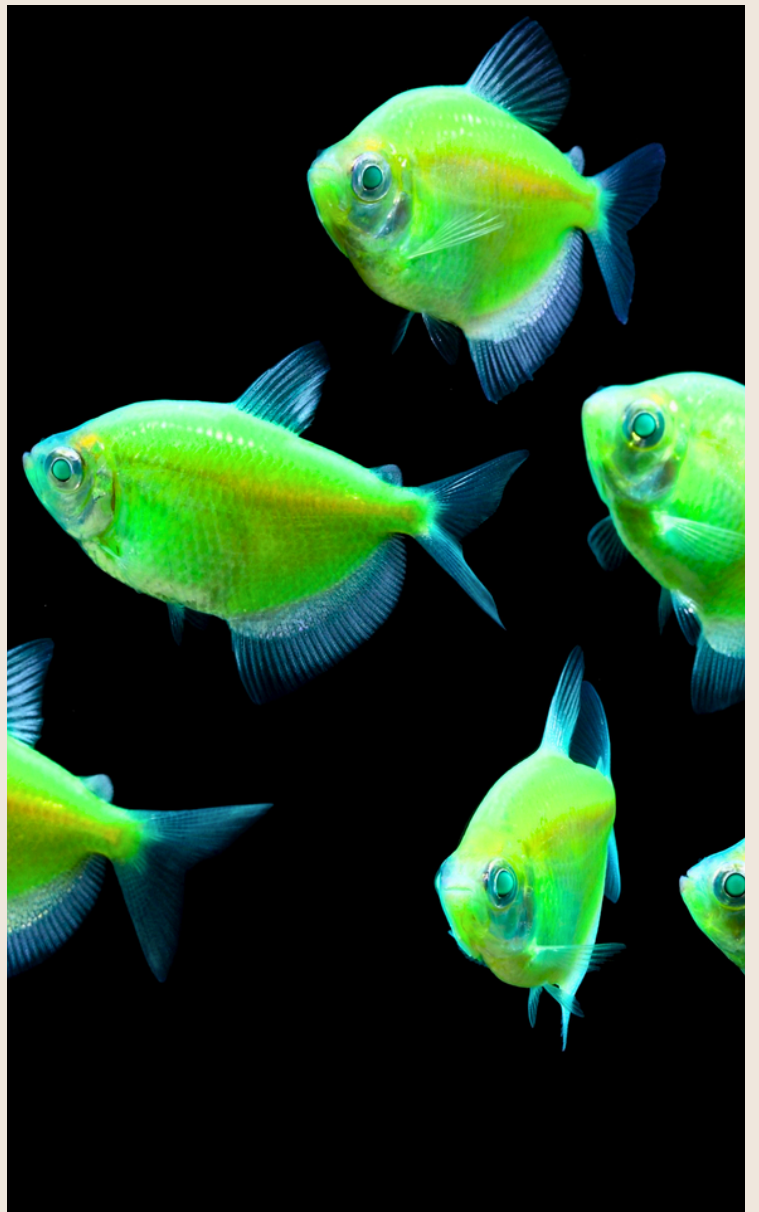
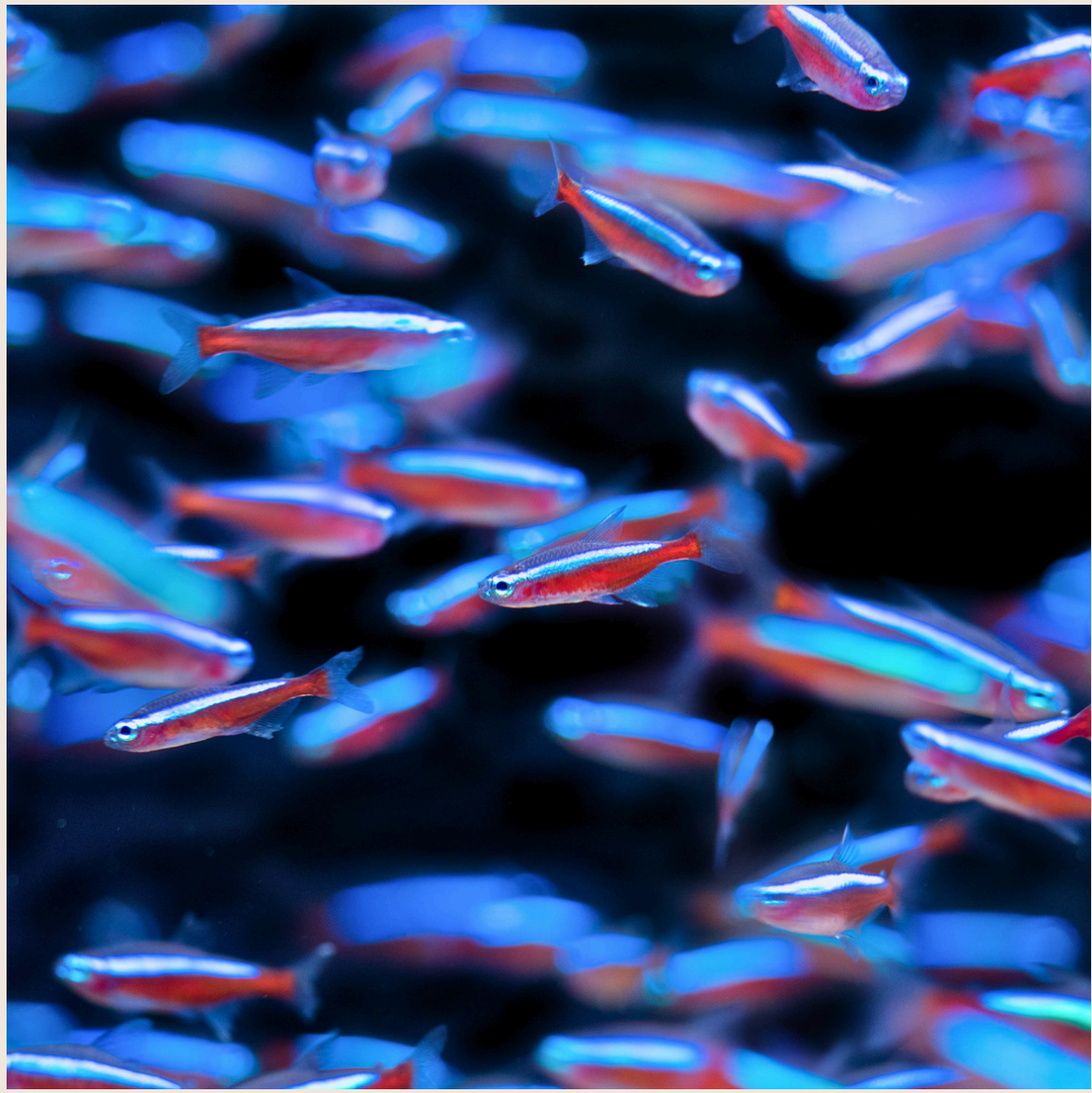

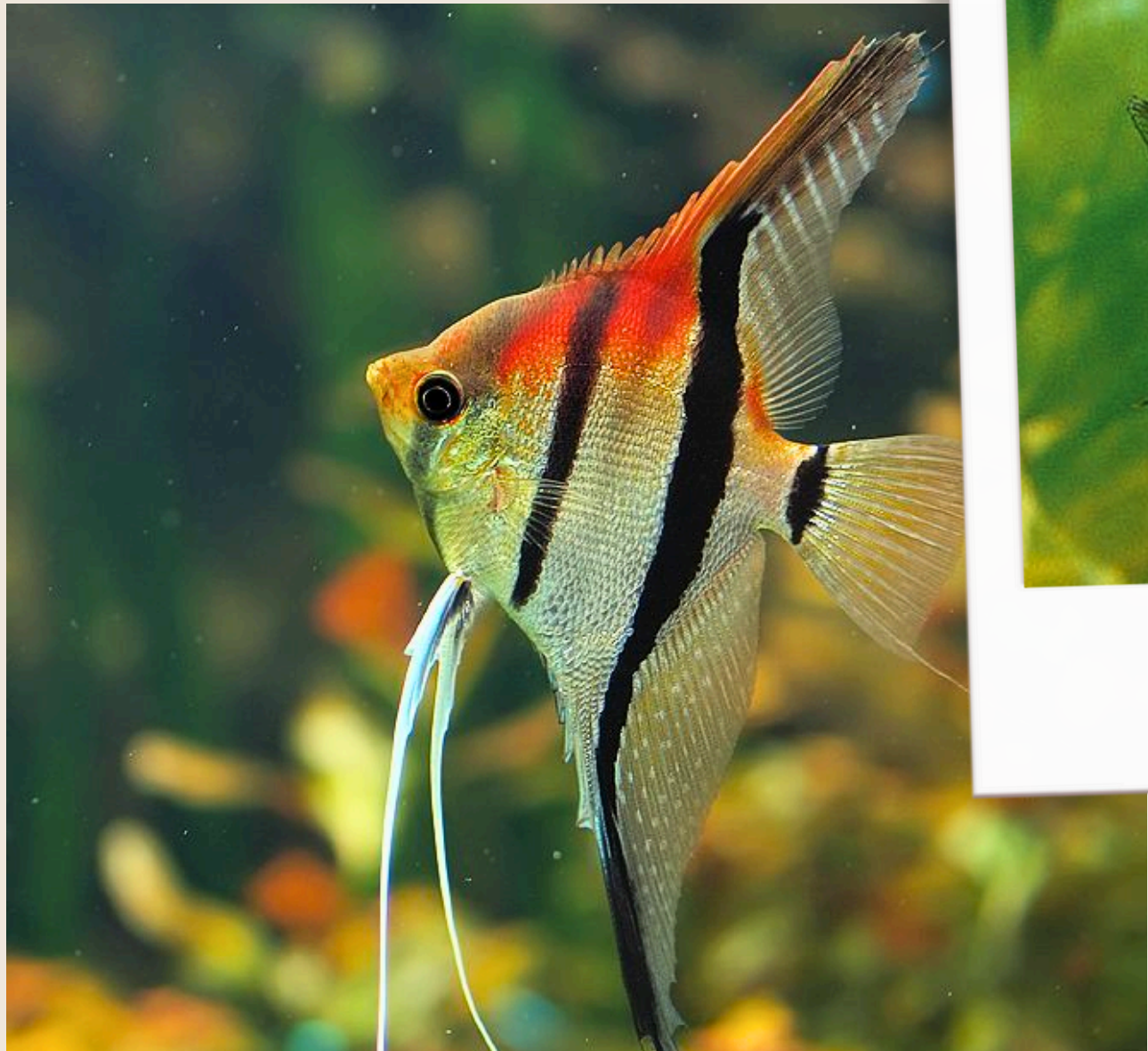

## Aqua Care - Planted Tank Fish (Tetra, Barb, Gourami, Angel)

- ✓ Beginner-Friendly: Yes (Most species are hardy & adaptable)
- ✓ Compatible: Other peaceful to semi-aggressive fish, shrimp (except with Angels & large Barbs)
- ✓ Diet: Omnivore (Pellets, flakes, live/frozen food, plant matter)
- ✓ Maintenance Level: Easy to Moderate
- ✓ Category: ● Base Hobbyist / ● Dedicated Hobbyist
- ✎ Special Care Notes:
  - Tetras (Neon, Cardinal, Rummy Nose) - Schooling fish, thrive in densely planted tanks.
  - Barbs (Cherry, Odessa, Pentazona) - Active, best in groups, some (like Tiger Barbs) may nip fins.
  - Gouramis (Honey, Dwarf, Pearl) - Peaceful, need hiding spots, may be territorial.
  - Angelfish - Elegant centerpiece fish, can grow large & may eat small tankmates (like tiny shrimp or small tetras).
  - Planted tanks require proper lighting, CO<sub>2</sub> (optional), and fertilizers for plant growth.

# AQUA CARE - LIVEBEARERS (GUPPY, MOLLY, PLATY, SWORDTAIL)

✓ Beginner-Friendly: Yes (Hardy & Easy to Breed)

✓ Compatible With: Other peaceful community fish (Tetras, Corydoras, Snails, Small Barbs, Shrimp)

✓ Diet: Omnivore (Pellets, flakes, algae, veggies, live/frozen food)

✓ Maintenance Level: Easy

✓ Category: ● Base Hobbyist / ● Dedicated Hobbyist

## ✎ Special Care Notes:

- Livebearers give birth to free-swimming fry instead of laying eggs, making them great for breeding projects.
- Guppies – Colorful & active, thrive in planted tanks.
- Mollies – Can tolerate brackish water, need space & stable water conditions.
- Platies – Hardy & peaceful, come in many colors.
- Swordtails – Males have a signature sword-like tail, need slightly bigger tanks.
- May overpopulate if males & females are kept together! Separate or introduce predators if fry control is needed.



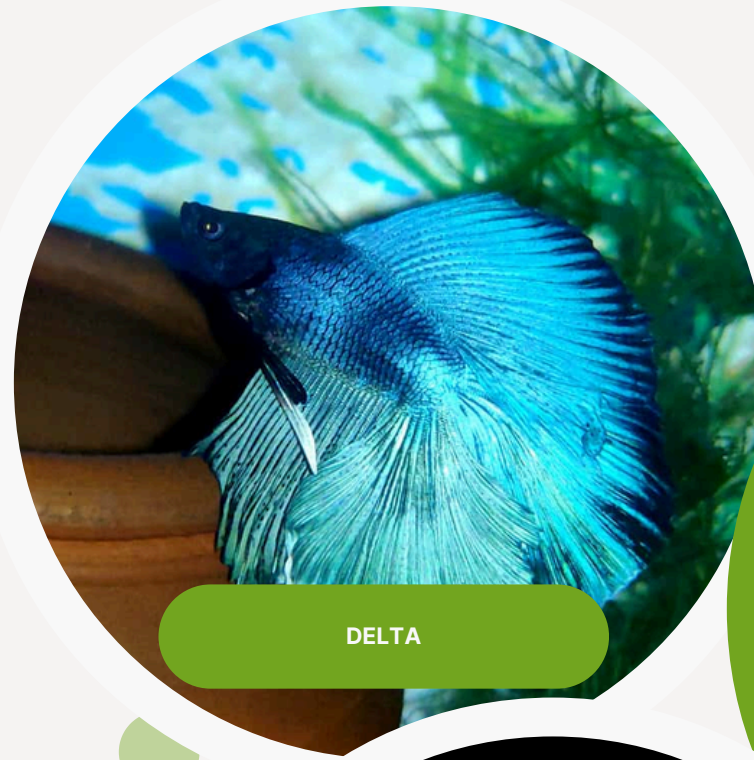




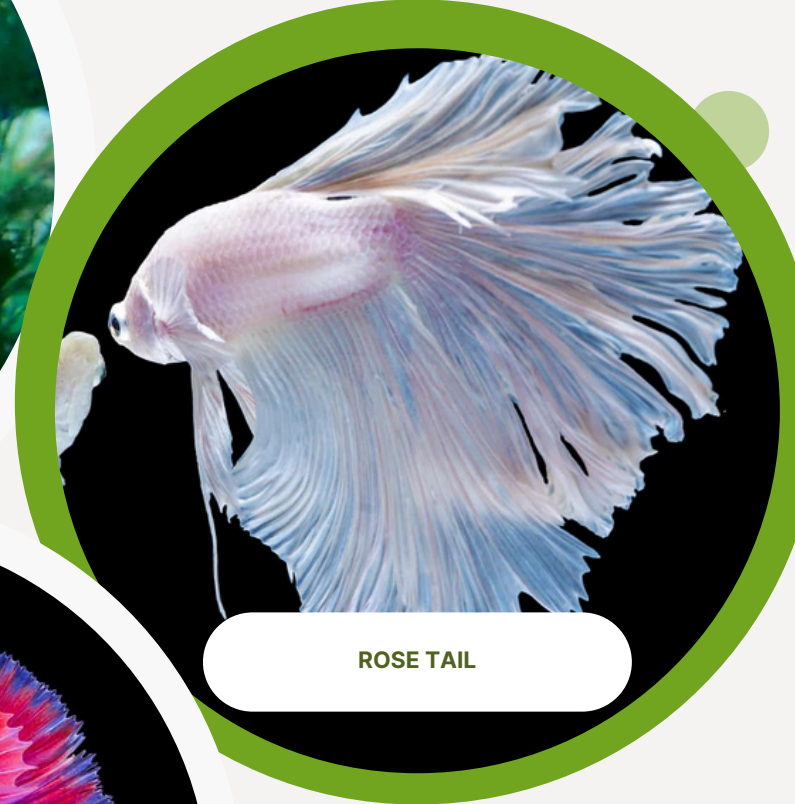

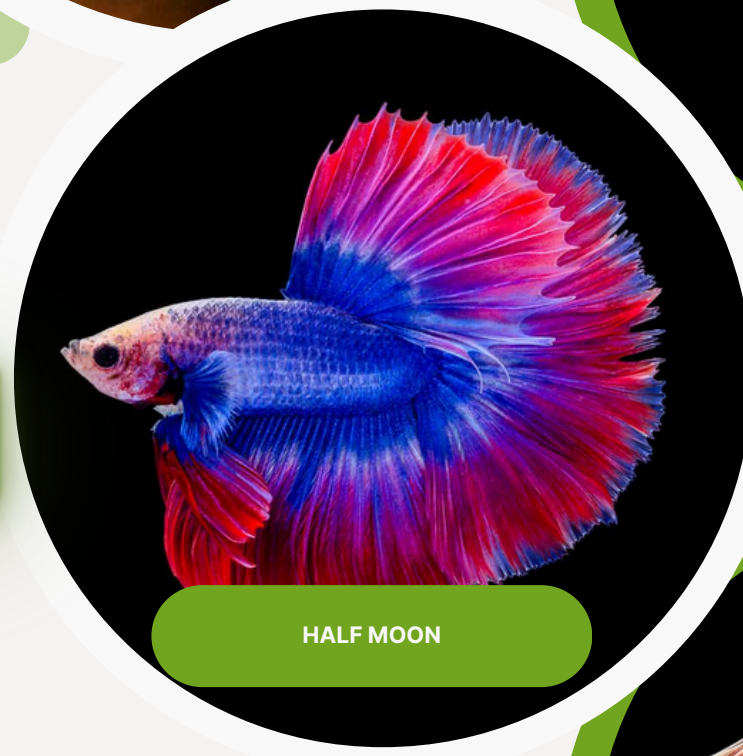

# BETTA HOUSE

## Tank setup

- **Use Nano Tanks:** A 1-foot planted nano tank is better than a bowl to mimic their natural habitat.
- **Substrate:** If adding stones, ensure no uneaten food gets trapped underneath.
- **Lid:** Always use a lid as Bettas can jump out.

## Water Care

- **Water Changes:** Replace 20% of the water weekly or bi-weekly instead of a full water change.
- **Safe Water:** Use dechlorinated water, and keep it clean to prevent diseases.
- **Temperature:** Keep water between 24–28°C (75–82°F).

✓ **Category:** ● **Beginner (Kid's favourite)**

## Feeding

- **Amount:** Feed 3–7 pellets per meal, two times a day.
- **Avoid Overfeeding:** Overfeeding can cause bloating and poor water quality.

## Behaviour

- **No Tank Mates:** Don't house Bettas with other fish, especially males.
- **Tank Placement:** Avoid placing two Betta tanks close to each other to reduce stress.

## Regular maintenance

- Remove uneaten food daily to prevent accumulation and water pollution.
- Vacuum the substrate periodically to keep the bottom clean.

# SALTWATER/MARINEWATER AQUARIUM FISHES

## Aqua Care

✓ Beginner-Friendly: ● Yes (Some Species) / No (Most Require Special Care)

✓ Compatible: Depends on species – Community Fish, Predators, or Semi-Aggressive Mix

✓ Diet: Omnivore / Carnivore (Marine Pellets, Frozen Foods, Live Feeds)

✓ Maintenance Level: Moderate to Expert

✓ Category: ● Dedicated Hobbyist / ● Expert

### ✎ Special Care Notes:

- Marine tanks require a different filtration system (Protein Skimmer, Sump, RO Water) to maintain stable water chemistry.
- Initial investment is higher than freshwater setups due to the need for marine salt, high-quality filtration, and specialized lighting.
- Anemones are available in the market and can be used, especially for clownfish hosting, but they require stable water conditions.
- Keeping coral reefs is banned in India, but artificial corals and marine-safe decorations can be used for aesthetics.
- Regular monitoring of salinity (1.020–1.025 SG), pH, and temperature is essential.

- **Beginner-Friendly Fish: Clownfish, Damsels, Blennies, Gobies, Firefish**
- **Moderate Care Fish: Tangs, Angelfish, Butterflyfish, Wrasses**
- **Expert-Level Fish: Lionfish, Groupers, Eels, Sharks, Triggerfish (Predatory species)**
